Mission Statement

The Tacoma-Pierce County Coalition to End Homelessness is Tacoma - Pierce County's response to homelessness. It is the mission of the Coalition to preserve and create affordable housing, prevent homelessness, restore homeless persons to stable living environments, and promote community awareness of homelessness issues through education, legislative advocacy, mutual support and the sharing of resources.

Purpose

- 1) Provide a network which shares ideas, concerns and resources applicable to homeless issues and foster collaboration in addressing their needs, and
- 2) Increase community awareness of the causes of homelessness, the needs of homeless people, and ways to end homelessness.

Grievance Procedure

Any individual who has a complaint with a shelter, homeless housing program, or housing first program, and is uncomfortable speaking with the administration of the program, may utilize the Coalition to End Homelessness Grievance Procedure.

Access Point 4 Housing

AP4H offers a point of entry for households experiencing homelessness (living on the streets, in their car, or in a shelter) or actively fleeing domestic violence.

SCREENING

During your initial phone call, a Staff Member will determine your eligibility for services within Pierce County, and schedule you for an in-person meeting.

CONVERSATION

During this meeting you will have a conversation with a staff member to talk about your current situation, explore resources and immediate solutions. Being scheduled does not guarantee that housing services will be provided. Once you have been scheduled for a conversation, please bring the following documents:

Documents you MUST bring to the meeting:

3 months of income verification for all household members aged 18+

Documents you need to bring if available:

· Signed homeless certification (this can be a letter from someone who knows you are experiencing homelessness, a letter from a shelter, etc.)

PRIORITY TOOL AND REFERRAL

During your conversation, if no housing options are identified, your information will be added to the Priority Pool. This pool is time limited. If a housing resource becomes available during the period of time you are in the pool you will receive a follow up phone call from a staff member.

Associated Ministries is an interfaith organization housing Pierce County's Coordinated Entry. This program serves individuals and families experiencing homelessness, including unaccompanied youth, young adults, and families, families transitioning from welfare to work, the elderly, individuals living with a disability, and people facing domestic violence. The agency's AP4H program offers access to services. When people are experiencing homelessness, they are screened for eligibility and referred to a Staff member for a conversation regarding their living situation, their options and resources. Referrals are made to housing programs (from shelter to permanent housing options) based on eligibility. These referrals are designed to connect clients with programs that best suit their needs. Associated Ministries also houses other programs including Paint Tacoma-Pierce Beautiful, Annual Hunger Walk, Disaster Preparedness, Domestic Violence Chaplaincy, Payee and Homeless Mail Services, Pierce County Asset Building Coalition, Moments of Blessing, Community Resource Connections Center, Youth Advancement Housing, Family Permanent Housing, Foreclosure Housing Counseling, and more.
