→ Senator Cantwell collecting stories for affordable housing campaign

Senator Maria Cantwell (D-WA) has launched a new tool to help make the case to expand the Housing Credit. The Senator is collecting personal stories from people who have struggled to afford housing &/or have experienced homelessness. Her office is looking for a large volume of stories to help demonstrate the widespread & urgent need to invest more federal resources in affordable housing.

To submit stories, access the tool on Senator Cantwell's website, "Affordable Housing & Homelessness: Share Your Story," & fill out the short form. We encourage you to share this with your networks, members & residents. Senator Cantwell is looking for stories from around the country – not just Washington State. Personal details will be shared only with permission. In March, Senator Cantwell kicked off a nationwide campaign to expand the Housing Credit. Her forthcoming legislation would increase Housing Credit allocation authority by 50 percent & make other changes to strengthen the program.

→ A Promising Practice: Asking the ACES Question – a training for those working with families

Will be held on Tuesday, May 17th from 9:00 – 3:30 in the Pierce County Environmental Services Center in University Place. This training is offered by the Evidence-Based Practice Committee of Pierce County & sponsored by the Washington Association for Children & Families.

This training will use the NEAR Toolkit to teach professional participants how to use the ACEs Questions to help parents understand the importance of protecting their children from abuse, neglect & toxic stress while giving them tools to build their own resilience. → HUD Office of Housing Counseling has established a new Disaster Recovery Website

The HUD Office of Housing Counseling has established a new Disaster Recovery Website featuring new toolkits for housing counseling agencies and other resources for housing counselors to utilize in the event a disaster strikes your community. The new website includes:

- 1. Disaster Recovery Toolkit, which includes:
- "Housing Counseling Disaster Program Guide" a universal document providing a model for HUD-approved housing counseling agencies to expand and support their long-term disaster recovery services as part of their grantee action plan in their respective jurisdictions receiving Federal disaster recovery funds.
- HUD Disaster Resources: This web page describes disaster resources available from HUD offices and agencies such as FHA, Ginnie Mae, Multifamily Housing, Fair Housing and Equal Opportunity, Policy Development and Research, Community Planning and Development, and others.
- FEMA Housing Portal: This portal is intended to help individuals and families, who have been displaced by a disaster find a place to live. The portal consolidates rental resources identified and provided by federal agencies.
- 2. Emergency Preparedness Toolkit, which includes:
- Emergency Preparedness Guide for Housing Counseling Agencies: This guide will provide useful and easy-to-implement information to assist housing counseling agencies successfully prepare for any type of disaster or emergency. Developing an Emergency Preparedness Plan is one of the most important strategic decisions you will make as a housing counseling agency.
- Emergency Preparedness and Recovery Resources for Housing Counseling Agencies: This document contains a comprehensive list of website resources to help housing counseling agencies assist and prepare their community for a disaster. The web links provided are best reviewed ahead of an actual disaster since Internet access is not guaranteed during emergency situations.
